BEHAVIOR STANDARDS FOR PARTICIPATION IN SCHOOL-SPONSORED, EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Any student wishing to participate in school-sponsored, extra-curricular activities who has accumulated 6 disciplinary points at any point will not be able to remain or to become a member of any extra-curricular organization, athletic team, or participate in any event.

Points are accumulated for the following way:

- a) ONE POINT for each referral to the office which results in detention or Saturday School.
- b) THREE POINTS for the first suspension and SIX POINTS for the second suspension.
- c) AFTER THREE SUSPENSIONS, the student is excluded from all activities for the remainder of the school year.

Any student suspended for any drug and/or alcohol and/or a weapon-related incident will serve the suspension and then meet with the advisor or coach and/or the assistant principal to determine the status of the student's continued participation in the extra-curricular/athletic team.

Eligibility for school-sponsored, extra-curricular activities includes a signed alcohol pledge and the academic eligibility criteria pertinent to all participants.

Probation Period for All Infractions:

Good behavior for 2 weeks eliminates 1 point. Good behavior means no referrals to the grade-level office.

These points are cumulative for the four years.

Eligibility for the fall is dependent upon behavior-point accumulation-at the conclusion of the previous school year. Point accumulation can be reduced by good behavior.

EMERGENCY SCHOOL CLOSING

The Cherry Hill Public Schools' emergency closing number is 551. In the event of inclement weather or any other emergency, this number will be broadcast by local radio and television stations. Please listen to the following radio stations for emergency closing information: KYW, WCAU, WFIL, WIBG, WIP, WPEN, and WCAM.

EMERGENCY EARLY DISMISSAL

In the event of the emergency closing of schools due to unforeseen conditions, e.g. winter storms, students will be dismissed early. Parents are encouraged to provide for alternate, safe supervision for their children.

ATTENDANCE INFORMATION AND PROCEDURES

School attendance is required "all the days and hours that school is in session." Attendance is taken in homeroom and each class daily.

Absence

If a student is absent, a parent or guardian should call the grade level office (424-2222) before 9:30 a.m. to report the reason for the absence.

Upon returning to school, the student must present a note signed by a parent/guardian to their Grade Level Office.

Absenteeism

Each student is required to attend class every day all the days and hours that school is in session. Absence from the classroom disrupts the teaching/learning process, and can significantly limit academic success.

Absences

Excused absences are limited to the following:

1. The student's illness
2. Requirements of a student's individual health care plan
3. A death or critical illness in the student's immediate family
4. Religious observance: In accordance with statute, no student absent for religious observance of a day recognized by the Commissioner of Education or this Board shall be charged with an unexcused absence, deprived of an award or eligibility/opportunity to compete for an award, or of the right to take an alternate to a test or examination missed through such absence
5. The student's suspension from school

6. Requirements of the student's Individualized Education Program (IEP)
7. Alternate short or long term accommodations for students with disabilities
8. The student's required attendance in court
9. Interviews with an admissions officer of an educational institution
10. Necessary and unavoidable medical or dental appointments that cannot be scheduled at a time other than the school day
11. Special permission from the New Jersey Department of Education (e.g. Take Your Child to Work Day)
12. Such good cause as may be acceptable to the principal

Students who exceed 12 absences in any full year course or seven absences in any semester course will be placed on a no-credit status in that course and will be required to appear before an attendance panel to present reasons why credit should not be removed permanently.

Early Dismissal

Early dismissals interrupt the educational process. Therefore, early dismissals should only be requested for medical appointments that **CANNOT** be scheduled at any other time or in the case of an emergency.

Dismissal Due to Illness

The Nurse's Office is located in the Administration wing. Students who become ill during the school day should notify their teacher immediately and request a pass to the Nurse's Office. If it is determined that a student should leave school and return home, the nurse will inform the parent and the student will be released from school IF THE PROCEDURE IS NOT FOLLOWED AND THE STUDENT LEAVES WITHOUT BEING PROPERLY DISMISSED, THE STUDENT WILL BE SUBJECT TO DISCIPLINARY ACTION AND/OR LOSS OF DRIVING PRIVILEGE.

Lateness to School

If you arrive late to school, you are to sign in immediately at your grade level office. At this time, you are to present a parental note, stating your reason for lateness. Unexcused lateness will result in detentions and/or Saturday School.

Lateness to Class

If you arrive late to class, you must present a pass to your teacher. The pass must be signed by a staff member explaining the reason for your lateness. Continued lateness will result in referral to the grade level principal for disciplinary action, detention and/or suspension.

Make Up Work

If you are absent from school, you are required to make up work missed in each class. It is the student's responsibility to obtain all make up work from his/her teachers immediately upon returning from school. Students who have unauthorized absences shall not be provided an opportunity to make up missed work.

Phone Calls

PHONE CALLS FOR STUDENTS WILL ONLY BE ACCEPTED IN THE CASE OF AN EMERGENCY.

Change of Address and/or Phone Number

Any student who has a change of address must report the change to Malberg Administration Building located at 45 Ranoldo Terrace. (Phone 429-5600) Two proofs of residency will be required.

SCHOOL RULES FOR STUDENT CONDUCT

Student Identification

In order to support a safe, respectful environment, students must identify themselves when asked to do so by a staff member. Students must carry their student identification cards at all times and produce their card upon request.

Student Dress

One of the main objectives of the school is to help its students in preparing successfully for life in the business and social world of today. We believe that training in appropriate dress and grooming, and in proper behavior, is part of this education. Good judgment should dictate what appropriate attire is for a particular occasion. School attire should be clean, appropriate and not extreme. Students whose attire, in the judgment of teachers and administrators, does not meet these criteria, will be referred to the grade level office. The first offense will be a conference with the assistant principal. The second offense may require a parent to bring a change of clothes to school. Certain items may be confiscated, i.e., hats, chains, etc. We urge all students to dress neatly and in good taste when in the classroom and especially at other academic and social occasions.

The following is a list of items and/or conditions that are **NOT** considered appropriate:

- . Clothing with patches, jewelry, chains, etc, that contain vulgarity, reference to alcohol, drugs, tobacco, Satanism or any instigative language.
- . Sunglasses or mirrored glasses in the building.
- . Clothing which is excessively tight, revealing or immodest, i.e. transparent blouse, bare midriffs, bare sides, mini skirts, spandex, or under clothing as outer garments.
- . Clothing with holes if the skin that is exposed is not allowed in the dress requirement listed.
- . Bare feet - students must wear footwear.
- . Clothing that could cause damage to school property, injury to yourself or others, i.e., chains, spikes, weapon-like jewelry.
- . Head covering of any type, i.e., hats, baseball caps, bandanas or sweat bands. Coats and/or jackets worn in classroom and corridors during the school day. (These items are to be placed in lockers upon arrival at school and are not removed until immediately prior to departure.)

Keeping the School Clean

It is every student's responsibility to help keep the school clean and neat. Visitors judge a school and its students by what they see, and a lack of cleanliness is noticed first. All of us spend many hours each day at East, and a dirty place is unpleasant. Keeping our environment clean is our responsibility. Trash receptacles are located in each classroom, in the halls, and in the cafeteria. Please use these receptacles to deposit all trash. Take pride in your school and help keep East clean at all times.

Closed Campus

Safety and accountability are necessary to maintain a productive environment.

Students are not permitted in the parking lot during the school day. STUDENTS WHO LEAVE THE SCHOOL BUILDING AND/OR PROPERTY, WITHOUT AN EARLY DISMISSAL, WILL BE SUSPENDED AND LOSE THEIR PARKING PRIVILEGE. Preventing theft and vandalism in this area is important for all of us.

Care of School Property

"The parents or guardians of any pupil who shall injure any school property shall be liable for damage for the amount of injury to be collected by the Board of Education of the district or any court of competent jurisdiction, together with costs of suit." (Title 1 8A:373) Therefore, any student who loses or damages school property will be required to reimburse the school for the lost or damaged items. Students who vandalize will be suspended.

OUTLINE OF STUDENT DISCIPLINE PROCEDURES

When a teacher or other school official has a concern about your behavior, the teacher will fill out a white disciplinary card and send it to your grade level principal.

The grade level principal will then arrange to see you as soon as possible. He or she will either send an appointment slip to your homeroom or call you out of class. If you have a test or class project that prevents you from reporting, stop at your grade level office and reschedule your appointment before the end of the day.

When the grade level principal meets with you, he or she will talk with you about the incident reported on the white card and then decide what action to take.

The Grade Level Principal may:

1. Give you a verbal reprimand and note the incident in your disciplinary records;
2. Send a written record of the disciplinary violation to your parents or guardians;
3. Assign you to after-school detention for a specific number of times;
4. Take away certain privileges such as participation in co-curricular or athletic activities;
5. Recommend that you be suspended either out-of-school or in-school for a specific number of days or recommend that you be suspended from school for the balance of the school year, and that you receive no credit toward graduation for that year;
6. If a student is involved in a physical confrontation, the school may recommend long-term

suspension or placement other than East in addition to arrest and formal charges for disorderly conduct or assault.

In all cases of serious incidents, repeated disobedience or suspension a conference with your parents or guardians will be required before you will be re-admitted to school.

Students who are absent from class without authorization and considered to be "in attendance" on the day of that absence shall be referred to the grade level office for cutting class. Students are "in attendance" when they are marked present in homeroom or marked late by the grade level office. If you cut a particular class (3) times you will be dropped from the class, receive detention or be suspended, receive no credit or grade for the subject, and be placed in a study hall.

The grade level principal will call you in and talk with you just as he or she does when you break other school rules. A notice of each cut will be sent to your parents.

CONTROLLED AND DANGEROUS SUBSTANCES

Smoking and/or possession of tobacco products which includes the use of electronic cigarettes and other electronic smoking devices, or paraphernalia, alcohol or any controlled dangerous substances (either under the influence or possession) is prohibited on school property and, as per Board of Education policies, could result in suspension from school and assignment to a 10 week early intervention program.

If a student is found to be involved with a controlled dangerous substance, the Board will enforce the laws of N.J., requiring a program of drug and alcohol education. Before a pupil is permitted to return to school, the pupil and his/her parent or guardian must agree to participate in a preventive/intervention drug counseling program. Students who are in possession of and/or under the influence of a controlled dangerous substance are suspended for 10 days for the first offense. A second offense could result in a recommendation to the Board of Education for long-term suspension from school and criminal charges may be filed.

TEST-TAKING RULES

The following rules must be observed during the classroom testing and during final exams.

- . Students are not permitted to talk or communicate with one another.
- . Students are not to glance at or copy other students' papers.
- . Students are not to have unauthorized supporting material in their possession.
- . Students are to remain in their seats throughout the test.

Violation of testing rules will be treated in the following manner:

- . The student will be notified by the teacher of the violation.
- . When a student violates the testing rules, the student will be given a **ZERO** for the test with no opportunity for makeup. The appropriate grade level assistant principal will be notified.
- . This procedure will also apply during final exams.

Plagiarism is the act of claiming the work or ideas of another as one's own. Procedures dealing with plagiarism will be the same as those violating testing procedures.

Interim Reports and report cards will be issued to each student in their homeroom on the dates indicated. The student takes these reports home to his/her parents. If the student is absent on the day Interim Reports or report cards are issued, it is the student's responsibility on the next day he/she is in attendance to secure the report from the main office. These reports need not be returned to the school by the students as copies are distributed to counselors and administrators. If there are any questions, please contact the student's guidance counselor. If you have not received the above reports by the indicated dates, please contact the student's guidance counselor.

A Current Performance Estimate may be sent home by your teacher at any time to indicate significant progress or lack of progress in class.

FINAL EXAMINATION

Unless there are extenuating circumstances, all final exams must be completed by the last day of school or by the last day of the course in the case of first semester courses. Under no circumstances will final exams be given prior to the exam schedule.

HOMEWORK PROCEDURES

Homework encourages and measures the development of self-discipline and associated good working habits. The extent and type of assignment should be planned according to grade and ability level. When systemically and fairly evaluated, homework reinforces lessons instructed in the classroom, thus enhancing student achievement. To be satisfying and beneficial, homework should address learning goals. It should be given to practice and reinforce learning, to challenge critical thinking, to apply knowledge and skills gained in class and to foster new knowledge. Homework should provide opportunities for students to use originality and creativity.

BEHAVIOR ON THE SCHOOL BUS

For the safety of all students, these rules must be followed:

1. All students must be seated while the bus is in motion.
2. No rough or boisterous play is permitted.
3. Students are not permitted to lean out from the windows of the bus.
4. No smoking is permitted.
5. Both to and from school, students are only permitted to ride the bus to which they have been assigned.
6. If a student wishes to ride another bus, permission is needed from the parents of both students and a school administrator. This can be done via a note sent to the Grade Level Office. We will follow with a phone call to confirm. Once confirmed, a bus pass will be issued to the student to show the bus driver that permission has been granted by the school.

Failure to follow these rules will result in disciplinary action.

AFTER SCHOOL DETENTION

After school detention may be assigned to a student by any teacher or administrator when the student has been found to have violated school rules. Teacher assigned detention will be served in a classroom designated by the teacher.

After-school detention assigned by an administrator will be held in a designated detention room from 2:30 P.M. TO 4:05 P.M. Failure to report to an assigned detention will result in additional detention or Saturday School.

COUNSELING SERVICES

Guidance Department

Counseling services are available to all students. The general aim of counseling is to help each student in his/her social, educational, vocational, and personal development. Conferences may be initiated by the counselor, student, teacher, or parent. If you want to arrange for a conference with your counselor, you may do so by completing a Guidance Appointment Request form in the guidance office. Assignment of counselors is done on an alphabetical and grade level basis.

Parent Conferences

Parents who wish to have a conference with a counselor and/or teacher(s) can do so by calling and requesting an appointment. Parents are encouraged to contact their son's/daughter's counselor concerning any question about his/her educational, vocational, or personal development. For those parents who find it impractical to attend a conference with the counselor during the regular school hours, each counselor has set aside one evening each month for parent conferences. The dates for the evening conferences will be published in September.

Student Assistance Counselor

Located in the Guidance Office, the Student Assistance Counselor serves as a coordinating agent between East and the community social services and assists pupils who are in need of special guidance. The Student Assistance Counselor is available to help students with questions and concerns about a variety of issues including those related to alcohol and drug use and abuse.

MARKING SYSTEM

An incomplete grade is given when a student has work which is to be completed prior to receiving a final grade for that particular marking period. In certain situations, a "G" grade is given when a student is not required to complete any additional work for a given marking period. When a student has been absent for an extended period of time, all incomplete work must be made up by the interim report date of the following marking period.

Final Grade Determination

Final grades are determined by multiplying the numerical value of each of the four marking period grades by two, adding the final exam grade, then dividing the total by nine for a final course grade.

Honor Roll

The Honor Roll gives recognition to students with high academic achievement at the end of each marking period. The names of Honor Roll students are posted on the bulletin board in C Wing. To be eligible, students must receive all A's, all B's or all A's and B's in their academic subjects.

Cum Laude Society

Membership in this scholastic honor society is open to juniors and seniors who meet the qualification requirement. Selection to the Cum Laude Society is based upon scholarship in a three tier process. Using the class rank as determined at the end of five semesters, the top 5% of the junior class will be identified as members designate. Using the class rank at the end of the sixth semester, the next 5% of the junior/senior class will be inducted into the society. Finally, at the end of seven semesters, the last top 5% will be inducted into Cum Laude. Membership, therefore, will have been offered to the top 15% of the class.

Cum Laude Society Tutoring Service

The Cum laude Society provides a tutoring service for those students who are experiencing difficulty in subject areas. A student may obtain help by having his/her subject class teacher initiate a request for help from the Cum Laude Society.

Ranking Scholars

At the end of the senior year, the top 1% of the graduating class will be named Ranking Scholars. These students are the academic leaders of the school.

A student's rank in class is determined by his/her cumulative grade point average earned in academic subjects only. Academic subjects include all courses offered in the English, Social Studies, Mathematics, Physical Science, Biological Science, and Foreign Language Departments.

ATHLETIC AND CO-CURRICULAR ELIGIBILITY

Athletics

All interscholastic athletic activities are governed by the by-laws of the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association. The following are the minimum eligibility requirements as stipulated by the NJSIM by-laws.

Students participating in fall or winter activities must meet the September 1 requirements. Students participating in spring activities must meet the January 31 requirements. However, students may become eligible on May 1 if they have earned 15 credits by that date.

Co-Curricular Activities

The minimum eligibility requirements for student to participate in co-curricular activities are the same as those established for athletics.

All co-curricular activities are year-round activities; therefore, students will be determined to be eligible for these activities based on the September 1 eligibility requirements. Students not eligible on September 1, however, may participate in the co-curricular activity during the second semester if they meet the January 31 eligibility requirements.

TEXTBOOK CARE AND REPLACEMENT

Students have the responsibility for keeping textbooks clean and covered at all times. If a student loses a book or a book is stolen, the loss should be reported to the teacher immediately. When reported, the teacher will issue the student a textbook obligation card indicating the fine for the replacement book. The student is to pay the fine for the lost textbook in the Main Office and have the textbook obligation card stamped paid. The fine will be levied on the lost text according to the condition of the text and its original cost. The guideline followed for levying fines are:

- If the condition of the book is GOOD 90%
- If the condition of the book is FAIR 75%
- If the condition of the book is POOR 50%

If a book is damaged or defaced, a fine will be imposed.

LOCKERS AND LOCKER SEARCH

Each student has an assigned locker. Lockers are on loan to students for storage purposes. Under the Constitution, all citizens are protected from unreasonable searches and seizures. However, students' lockers are not legally protected from search or seizure of any material in the locker. The locker may be searched if it is suspected to contain stolen goods, weapons, drugs, or any item(s) that may endanger the health, safety or welfare of student/staff.

THIS ALSO APPLIES TO STUDENT VEHICLES THAT ARE PARKED IN THE SCHOOL LOT.

GENERAL INFORMATION

ANNOUNCEMENTS AND BULLETINS

Announcements are made once daily - during homeroom. You are expected to give your full attention to these announcements. Please remember that while every announcement may not pertain to you, common courtesy requires that you allow others to receive the information. P.A. announcements are designed to supplement those announcements which appear in the Weekly Bulletin. The bulletin should be read daily and posted in your homeroom.

CABLE TV AND CHANNEL 19

Channel 19 is a district cablecast service to Cherry Hill families. Weekly programs emanate from our Junior and Senior schools. Please refer to Channel 19 for emergency coverage and special programs throughout the year.

FLAG SALUTE

The morning announcements always begin with a pledge of allegiance to the flag. If, for some reason, you are not in your homeroom during the pledge but are in the hallways, you must stop and quietly wait until the pledge is over.

FORGERY

When a student has forged a school document such as (1) absent notes, (2) early dismissal notes; (3) athletic permission forms, (4) doctors notes or permission forms; or similar types of documents, he/she will be subject to disciplinary action and/or suspension.

LATE BUSES

Late buses are provided for students who remain after school for extra help, detention, athletics, or co-curricular activities. These busses depart from outside the library entrance at 4:10 p.m. Upon completion of your after-school work, students waiting for the late bus are to report to the Library. Students who walk or loiter around the building will be subject to disciplinary action.

LOST AND FOUND

Students who find lost articles are asked to take them to Communications at the main entrance where they can be claimed by the owner. Student who lose books or personal items are to check in at Communications or the lost and found area located in the stockroom, to see if they have been found. If you cannot locate lost items see the Campus Police immediately.

STUDENT PARKING

To park on school property, a student must be assigned a parking decal number which will correspond to the student's assigned parking space by the Campus Police. When all student parking spaces have been assigned, there will be no additional parking decals issued. Any vehicle that does not display a parking decal is subject to a ticket and tow even if the vehicle is authorized to be parked in the parking lot.

In order to receive a parking permit, the student must:

1. Fill out an application for student parking and have the application signed by a parent/guardian. Applications are available in the Campus Police Office.
2. Completed applications will be reviewed by the Campus Police Officers and upon approval will be given an assigned parking area, with a parking sticker indicating said area.

3. Applications will be approved based on the following criteria:

Assigned parking areas will be based on need as indicated in the application and may be subject to a lottery if there is a shortage of space.

Students who apply for a parking sticker must submit a \$50.00 fee. This policy took effect on September 1, 1989 and revised in 1999. The only students who will not have to pay the \$50.00 fee are those who are enrolled in the work study programs. Fees and parking permits are handled by the Campus Police. If your parking privilege is revoked because of disciplinary action, parking fee is not refundable.

CAMPUS POLICE

Police School Officers are assigned to East High School to assist students, faculty and administration during the school day and at activities and athletic contests after school.

VISITORS

Parents or guardians who wish to visit must make previous arrangements through the principal's office. Cherry Hill East students MAY NOT bring visitors to school. Parents who are in the building for any reason may be approached and asked to identify themselves and sign in at communications.

**Alcohol Detection Device- Passive Alcohol Sensor (PAS):
Procedures for use with students.**

PURPOSE: The Alcohol Detector- Passive Alcohol Sensor (PAS) is an instrument that accurately measures the presence of alcohol emitted from the exhaled air of a person from the evaporation of alcohol from a drink. Alcohol vapors electronically activate a multi-colored bar-graph that indicates the approximate alcohol concentration in the air sample. This passive, non-intrusive device will be used as a PREVENTION tool to encourage all student to attend extra-curricular events completely alcohol-free. Use of the PAS device is primarily an additional method to aid in the enforcement of our existing drug and alcohol policies. The district will continue to follow NJ 18A:40A-12 with respect to Medical clearance and Drug testing procedures.
